




2016 - 17 Citizenship Award for Diversity Leadership recipient, Mariam Khan.



Mariam Khan of Arlington, Va., has been named the 2016-2017 recipient of the University of Mary Washington's Citizenship Award for Diversity Leadership.

The annual award is given to a rising senior enrolled as a full-time student in an undergraduate degree program at UMW. The student must maintain high academic standards, possess characteristics of leadership and make a personal commitment to advocating an appreciation for diversity and inclusion on campus. As the award recipient, Khan will serve as an active spokesperson for diversity and inclusion, a peer mentor to students and a voice for underrepresented populations.

'I hope to continue the work of diversity and inclusion on UMW's campus," said Khan, a double major in sociology and women's and gender studies who was born in Kashmir. "A good leader immerses themselves in their cause while also being a guiding hand, and I think I can do that for UMW."

She has been a leader within the student body since her arrival on campus

three years ago. A highly active member and past president of the Islamic Student Association (ISA), Khan has helped to organize campus-wide programs such as Fast-A-Thon and panel discussions that have helped foster a better understanding of Islam and Muslims. She also participates in the UMW chapter of UNICEF; is an executive board member of Women of Color; and has served as an orientation leader to welcome new students to UMW for two summers.

During her senior year, she will continue to be a member of the Student Government Association's Diversity and Unity Coordinating Committee and the student-run Finance Committee. She will continue her role as a RISE (Resources Inspiring Student Excellence) mentor, helping new student adjust to a college setting. In addition, she plans to live in the university's Framar House, an international living community, where she will implement events that promote diversity and inclusion within the UMW community.

After graduation, she plans to pursue graduate work in women and gender studies in preparation for a role that contributes to fighting for the equality of women around the world. (Credit-University Relations)

New James Farmer Post Doctoral Fellow in Civil Rights and Social Justice Joins JFMC Staff



Dr. LaWanda M. Wallace, earned her doctorate from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro (UNCG) in Cultural Studies of Education. She also has a certificate in Women's & Gender Studies from UNCG.

Wallace's research focuses on dominant norms; more specifically, how these norms affect minority populations in the United States. Inspired by Freire, she utilizes a radical facilitation approach to education with the true belief that education can be used as a form of liberation to free people from their internalized oppressions.

She hails from Greensboro, NC where she spent the last three years working as an Adjunct Assistant Professor in the Human Development & Services department at North Carolina A&T State University. She also has experience working in the office of Multicultural Affairs as well as Intercollegiate Athletics. In all her roles, Wallace's top priority has been the successful matriculation of students.

Wallace basic interests include reading, working out (specifically teaching body pump classes) and spending time with family and friends. She is an active member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., which also takes up a great deal of her time.

Being the third recipient of the James Farmer Post Doctoral Fellowship in Civil Rights and Social Justice is an extreme honor to Wallace. She does not take this position and the responsibility to uphold the profound legacy of Dr. Farmer lightly. She is most excited about working with faculty, staff and students to address issues of social justice and the multiplicity of ideas and beliefs that each of us holds which may be inhibiting forward progress in our modern times. Above all immersing herself within the UMW community and leaving a lasting positive impact is most important to her.
