Inaugural Year for RISE Peer-Mentoring Program a Success!



The RISE (Resources Inspiring Student Excellence) Peer Mentoring Program had a successful launch at the beginning of Fall 2012 with 20 current students as mentors (UMW sophomores-seniors) and 28 first-year students as mentees. Within the mentee group, 26 were freshmen and two were transfer students.

Workshops and activities were sponsored throughout the year for the students' academic, cultural and social development. They focused on topics such as time management, study skills, effective writing skills, class schedule building, academic engagement outside of the classroom, (e.g., highlighting internships and study abroad opportunities), and the importance of mentors and networking. In addition, there were several cultural and social activities. They included trips to Washington, D.C. and bowling outings in Fredericksburg. The participants also attended many of the cultural

and traditional programs and events on campus.

During the end-of-year informal recognition program in late April, the attendees shared how the RISE program and their mentor or mentee affected their lives and experiences throughout the year. Based on the testimonials from the RISE mentors and mentees, it was evident that positive relationships were developed among the RISE participants. Overall, the mentors, diligently and consistently, provided their mentees with personal, social, and academic support throughout the year. The mentees' feedback indicated they were satisfied with their participation in the RISE Program. They stated that the program made them feel more connected and more confident in their ability to succeed at UMW. They also felt that the RISE Program was helpful to their academic and personal adjustment to the campus community.

The inaugural year of the RISE Peer Mentoring Program effectively met the objectives for the program. The second year of the program will build on the success of the first year. The program will continue to help first-year students connect and engage with the UMW community, have positive academic, social, and personal growth, and have a successful first year in college. The RISE Program will continue to provide a positive leadership development opportunity for the mentors.


