Human Rights Film Series Debuts

As part of our ongoing commitment to social justice and honoring the legacy of Dr. James Farmer, the James Farmer Multicultural Center announces a new initiative this year: the Human Rights Film Series. In its inaugural year, the Human Rights Film Series will screen documentaries dealing with issues and topics, such as the rights of undocumented immigrants, the struggles of indigenous peoples to reclaim their cultures, and the crucial and significant role women played during the Civil Rights Movement.

In September, Jose Antonio Vargas' "Documented: a Film About an

Undocumented Immigrant" will be shown. This film details the life and struggles of Vargas, a Pulitzer prize winning journalist, immigrant rights activist, and an undocumented immigrant. In November, "We Still Live Here-Âs Nutayneân," by Anne Makepeace, documents the challenges and successes of the Wampanoag peoples of southeastern Massachusetts in reclaiming their native language. Lastly, in February, Sharon La Cruise's "Daisy Bates: First Lady of Little Rock" details the life of the incredibly influential but largely forgotten civil rights activist, Daisy Bates.
