**UMW STUDENT LEADERS** ATTEND ANNUAL AASLE CONFERENCE IN D.C.



Over the Winter Break, 14 Mary Washington students, representing seven multicultural and social justice clubs, traveled to Washington, DC to attend the 7th Annual African-American Student Leadership Experience (AASLE). These experiential workshops took place from January 4 - 7, 2018, and hosted attendees from colleges and universities throughout the east coast and as far west as Illinois. This is the second year that these workshops included the Asian American, Pacific Islander and the Chicano, Hispanic, Latino Leadership tracks, which greatly expanded opportunities for participation for diverse groups, and richly contributed to the intercultural dialogues for all participants throughout the conference.

The theme was "Nexus: What it Looks Like, What it Sounds Like, What it is!" Ms. Zephia Bryant, founder and CEO of the Bryant Educational Leadership Group, LLC, which sponsors these experiences, stated, "These Experiences have been designed to equip you with what is needed to define, galvanize, and activate the next generation." She further stated that they "... are intended to be immersion experiences rooted in the historical, cultural, and spiritual tenants of our communities.'

As the students reflected on their time there, they all remarked how impacted they were by engaging in the workshops, attending the keynote addresses, and collaborating with their peers on the various group presentations. One of our students pronounced, "As I attended each workshop, I felt as if I came out as a renewed person." Another student stated, "...The knowledge given to me during the experience has given me more confidence ... to implement more leadership roles within my clubs and daily." It truly was a rewarding experience for all!

On Saturday, March 24, 2018, the James Farmer Multicultural Center will be hosting its second annual Social Justice & Leadership Summit. The purpose of the Summit is to create an opportunity for UMW students to develop a theoretical framework and applicable understanding of leadership, social justice, and allyship. Additionally, this summit will provide attendees with an opportunity to build coalitions across cultural barriers, strengthen advocacy, and support the promotion of an equal, equitable campus culture and climate at UMW. In 2016 Megan L. Clark made history as the first African-American and first woman to become commonwealth's attorney of Prince Edward County, with the endorsement of Attorney General Mark Herring. A 2001 graduate of Prince Edward County High School, Clark graduated summa cum laude from

Longwood University. She taught high school Spanish in Prince Edward before earning a juris doctor from the Marshall-Wythe School of Law at the College of William & Mary. Clark has been a prosecutor since being admitted to practice law in Virginia.
